LEAGUE STILL GOING STRONG AFTER 90 YEARS *Daily Herald*

Selections from the article that appeared in the online *Daily Herald* on October 26, 2010 by Susan Dibble

Back in 1920, at a time when women were poised to win a constitutional amendment giving them the right to vote, the League of Women Voters was born in Chicago. Ninety years later, the women and men of the league still are registering voters, holding candidates nights, and speaking out on national, state and local issues. A nonpartisan organization, the league does not affiliate with a political party or endorse candidates in an election. But individual members are encouraged to be politically active, unless they hold the position of league president or voter service chairman.

Nationwide, the league has 170,000 members and financial supporters... The league is strong in all 50 states and operating in over 800 communities. Nationally over the years, the league successfully has supported measures that include aid for maternal and child-care programs, the passage of Social Security, putting more federal jobs under Civil Service, and making voter registration easier. The league long has endorsed a national health care plan, but supported the legislation passed under the Obama administration because it incorporated many of the league's goals for health care...

Leagues take a position only after study of an issue. Positions are arrived at by consensus, rather than by majority vote. When the league speaks on an issue, its position reflects grass-roots support... Once a league takes a position on an issue, it publicizes it, makes its study results open to the public and lobbies for legislation.... Of course, all this thoughtful discussion of issues requires work.

UPDATES ON THIS YEAR'S LOCAL ACTION ITEMS



Housing for Mentally Ill: **Discrimination Suit Filed in Federal & State Courts** Details behind last month's brief News Flash

In October the John Marshall Fair Housing Law Clinic (JMFHLC, working *pro bono*) wrote to the Village, asking that they reconsider their decision of last May to reject the Boeger project. At the November 1 Village Board meeting the trustees met in executive session to consider the matter, and a few days later the Village contacted our developer, the Daveri Development Group, and said they would not reconsider.

So the Task Force, Daveri, Thresholds, and the owners of the Boeger Dr. site, represented by the JMFHLC, filed a discrimination suit in both federal and state courts. The suit will allege that the village violated fair housing laws and the ADA, and will ask the court to enjoin the Village to make those reasonable accommodations.

The suit cited a great deal of statutory and case law, including one nearby precedent in a very similar case, *Oconomowoc Residential Programs v. Milwaukee*. In that case both the district court and the appellate court ruled that law required a municipality to make reasonable accommodations to its zoning codes to allow housing for people with disabilities, and that those accommodations would be unreasonable only if they imposed undue financial or administrative burdens on the municipality, or if the accommodations forced extreme changes to the zoning regulations. Our project does neither.

The court also stated that "The City cannot rely on the anecdotal evidence of neighbors opposing the group home as evidence of unreasonableness. A denial of a variance due to public safety concerns or concerns for the safety of the residents themselves cannot be based on blanket stereotypes about disabled persons . . ."

NAMI Award Our League is this year's "Friend of NAMI" Illinois winner

UPDATE ON GAMBLING EXPANSION AT ARLINGTON PARK

A huge gambling expansion bill (SB 737) was passed in the Illinois Senate during the fall Veto Sessions. It would bring slot machines to all 6 racetracks in Illinois and land based casinos to 5 additional communities, including a casino in Chicago which would be twice as big as any other in Illinois. The Illinois House and Senate will be back in Springfield in early January for an extra Veto Session before newly elected legislators take office. The House is expected to amend SB 737. If it passes it will have to go back to the Senate for another vote. Arlington Park Racetrack would get 1200 slot machines, which would be similar to the 9 casinos now operating in Illinois and the one being built in Des Plaines.

Please let your State Representative and State Senator know your opinion about this bill and particularly about a casino at Arlington Park. The bill would pre-empt Arlington Heights Home Rule authority, so the community and the Village Board would have no ability to refuse the slot machines or to regulate any of the operations.

Plans are in formation for a Town Hall Meeting with our state legislators on this issue. The timeline is short, but if it works out, it will be during the week of December 27. Watch the local newspapers and your e-mail for more information. Thanks to our League for co-hosting the Community Forum on October 25. Abolition of the Death Penalty in Illinois

Pass SB 3539

Sad to say, the Illinois House leadership was not able to squeeze in the repeal bill on the House floor on Dec 1st. Plans are to maintain the present momentum and return for the Lame Duck Session in January. To date, I've heard no indications as to how Representatives Mark Walker or Sid Mathias might vote on repeal of the death penalty. In a meeting of our League and a rep from the Coalition with Rep Walker at his office on November 10th, he said that he doesn't choose to reveal beforehand how he will vote on measures.



Nov 29th Rally in Springfield. Cindy Greenwood and I drove to Springfield for this Rally sponsored by the Illinois Coalition to Abolish the Death Penalty. The focus of this Rally was to gather people of various faiths in a show of support for abolition. There was expectation the Judiciary Committee would listen to representatives of the group in their hearing today and possibly send the Repeal Bill SB3539 on to the House Floor for a vote. We were somewhat disappointed to learn that the hearing was postponed. But we were able to gather with the group of supporters [wearing bright red buttons] outside of the House Chamber when the Reps had entered it this morning. Cindy left a note for Mark Walker with his secretary and we divided into clusters to visit offices of Reps -- leaving literature and making our presence known. Cindy and I were glad to have gone and been members of this positive group.

FRACING: The Battle over the Need for Clean Water and Clean Energy

Our November program on the use of hydraulic fracturing to obtain natural gas at the cost of contaminated water supplies and sick nearby residents has attracted the interest of several Leagues. As one Leaguer noted, while we are concerned about energy independence now, clean water will be the next battle. Living near the Great Lakes, we forget many other areas have acute water shortages.

For those who did not attend, one fact alone should grab your attention: gas and oil development and production are exempt from ALL federal environmental laws. I will email copies of the program handouts. Please take the time to read them. This issue has been the topic of news segments in the media (CNN, MSNBC, and others – even BBC America). However, the campaign to reinstate federal regulations will take the efforts of everyone to overcome the huge influence of the gas and oil lobby.

Newsweek, Dec13, reports: “With the House in Republican hands, fracing is likely to survive efforts to regulate it under the Safe Drinking Water Act.”...“PA Governor-elect Tom Corbet will soon reopen state land to new drilling...as many as 10,000 wells up from 25 today.”...“NY Governor-elect Andrew Cuomo is also open to lifting his state’s moratorium.”

The election was the first since the U.S. Supreme Court [decision]. Companies and wealthy individuals funneled millions into outside groups, many of which didn’t disclose their donors.

In the 10 races that the Republican groups spent the most money on, the party entered the winner’s circle six times, with the U.S. Senate race in Washington still too close to call. Among the winners, all Republicans: Senate candidates Pat Toomey in Pennsylvania and Mark Kirk in Illinois, and former Nevada state Senator Joe Heck in a Las Vegas-area congressional district. Public Citizen, a Washington-based advocacy group that supports stronger campaign finance laws, found that 58 of 74 winners benefited from more outside spending than their opponents.

Team Effort

American Crossroads discloses its donors and Crossroads GPS doesn’t. The two groups, advised by Rove, who was President George W. Bush’s chief political strategist, spent \$38 million, more than any other organization – and all of it went to help elect Republican candidates. Crossroads officials regularly met with representatives of allied groups, such as American Action Network, to plan strategy.

The Chamber of Commerce spent almost \$30 million, including \$2 million in support of Democratic incumbents. The chamber, which doesn’t disclose its donors, fought efforts in Congress to require outside groups funding political ads to identify the sources of their money; Senate Republicans blocked the legislation in September. Chamber President Tom Donohue attributed the election results to voters “who clearly stated that a strong and vibrant private sector is critical to reviving our economy...”

Secrecy Criticized

Elisabeth MacNamara, president of the League of Women Voters, based in Washington, criticized the secrecy behind the donations, “Voters will be hard-pressed to know if their elected officials are in Washington to serve the public interest or the special interests.”

Craig Holman, who handles campaign finance issues for Public Citizen, said that the 2010 spending was just a taste of what to expect in the presidential election two years from now. “The 2010 election provided a preview of the outside spending expected during the 2012 presidential race,” Holman said. “Sadly, 2010 was just a practice run for these guys.”

**LWVCC November Lunch and Learn: Cook County Public Defender:
“They Are the Guardians of Our Most Cherished Democratic Ideals”**

This is how Cook County Public Defender Abishi C. Cunningham, Jr. (retired Judge) described the people who work in the Public Defender’s Office at the November 15 *Lunch & Learn with the League* sponsored by the League of Women Voters of Cook County. But far too often, public defenders face questions such as “Why would you want to be part of that group?” and “How can you sleep at night?” when they are in social settings.

Judge Cunningham told the Lunch & Learn audience that fortunately for the people of Cook County, the people who work in the Public Defender’s Office are dedicated to the cause of making sure the legal system works, and they truly feel they have a calling. As a result, there is an amazingly low rate of turnover in the slightly over 700 person office that, besides attorneys, includes other professional and support staff, such as investigators. (Note that this total number is dramatically down from the 840 FTE positions in the years 2000-2004.) Many have been employed in the Office for 30 or more years.

The mission of the Office is to protect the rights and dignity of each person accused of a crime. Public Defenders are appointed by judges to represent those accused of a crime who cannot afford a private attorney. The staff works out of the Criminal Courts building at 26th and California (which members of the Cook County League toured several months ago) and the five suburban Cook County court houses and Juvenile Court. There is also a 37 member Elite Homicide Unit that defends indigent people accused of capital crimes, along with an Appellate Unit and a Forensic Science Division. Audience members were surprised to learn that the Public Defender’s Office has to pay for its own evidence tests, as well as ballistic and other experts. Where does the money come from? We the taxpayers: mainly from Cook County government, though the State of Illinois also is supposed to supply the money for the Capital Litigation Trust to cover the costs of murder cases. However, as further evidence of the problems with State finances, the State is in arrears from 2009 and has paid nothing toward the amount owed for fiscal year 2010. The County is covering the shortfall in the meantime.

Judge Cunningham applauded the League for its efforts to repeal the death penalty. Aside from the moral issues, he stressed that there were millions of dollars more that are being spent on cases involving the death penalty that could be saved or spent more wisely to improve the justice system. Further, it costs the State of Illinois (and therefore the taxpayers) far more to pursue the death penalty than to house convicted murderers for life without parole.

Judge Cunningham, son of the first African American lawyer in West Virginia, was appointed by the President of Cook County to serve a 6-year term as the Public Defender in 2009. From 1986 until that time, he served as a judge in the Cook County Circuit Court, handling both criminal and civil cases. He has also had two separate stints in the State’s Attorney’s Office, as well as working in private practice and as an adjunct professor at both the DePaul and John Marshall Schools of Law. Judge Cunningham proudly told the audience that his sister is the presiding judge in the 6th district at Markham.

This bipartisan legislation will provide a path to citizenship for young immigrants who complete a college degree or serve in the military, thereby enabling them to be a fully productive part of American society. League to Incoming House Leadership: Retain and Strengthen Office of Congressional Ethics

The League, in coalition with nine other groups, held a press conference to urge the incoming House leadership of the 112th Congress to continue the Office of Congressional Ethics (OCE) and to oppose any efforts to weaken or undermine that Office. Earlier in the week, League President Elisabeth MacNamara sent a letter to Speaker-elect Boehner.

LWVUS Privatization Study Committee

In accordance with direction from Convention 2010, the LWVUS will undertake a study of "Privatization: the policy agenda to transfer government functions, services and assets to the private sector." This study will focus on the impact of privatizing government services on local communities. Committee members develop study materials and consensus questions and review/tabulate responses submitted.

League Supports the CEDAW Treaty

On November 19, the League of Women Voters joined with over 100 coalition partners in support of the Convention for the Elimination of all Forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW) Treaty in a statement to the Senate Judiciary Subcommittee on Human Rights and the Law.

Campaign for the Civic Mission of Schools Petition

The League, as part of the Campaign for the Civic Mission of Schools, is sponsoring a petition to remind all policymakers of the essential and historic role schools play in providing the knowledge, skills and disposition for informed and engaged citizenship. The Campaign is asking all Americans nationwide to sign this petition reminding policymakers of the three essential C-s of education: preparation for College, Career and Citizenship. 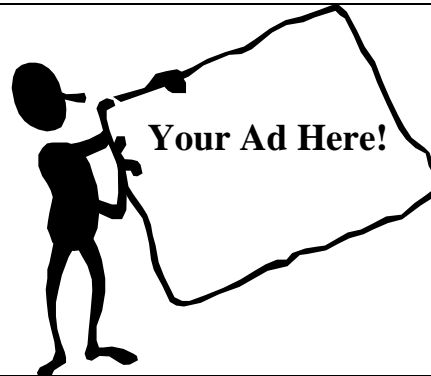
